THE BOARD OF REGENTS ELECTED DR. PATRICK E. MOTTRAM TO MASTERSHIP OF THE AMERICAN COLLEGE OF PHYSICIANS



Michael J. Tan, MD, FACP, FIDSA and Chair of the Awards Committee of the American College of Physicians announced the Board of Regents decision to elect Dr. Patrick E. Mottram to Mastership. Mastership is conferred on a select number of worthy candidates who are deemed distinguished through a combination of achievements, including the practice of internal medicine, academic contributions to the specialty of Internal Medicine and service to the College.

In making decisions about each candidate's suitability for Mastership, the Committee considered qualities such as strength of character, integrity, perseverance, leadership, compassion and devotion, as well as clinical expertise and commitment to advancing the art and science of medicine.

Emphasis is placed on service as a teacher and mentor, advocacy for quality in internal medicine, a commitment to social justice, deep interest in people and the creation of communities of medicine. Additionally, those elected to Mastership should be "citizen physicians," educational innovators, humanists and learner-teachers who inspire others to seek high standards and excellence in the specialty of Internal Medicine. As a Master of the American College of Physicians, Dr. Mottram embodies these qualities.


2020 SPIRIT OF NUNEZ AWARD

mental health

COVID-19 has unfortunately seen an uptick in the need for mental health services for all people, but especially for children and adolescents. During the last year, students have struggled with anxiety, depression and suicidal ideation. The social isolation, financial instability, increase in substance abuse and overall exacerbation of ongoing issues within homes have greatly contributed to these increased mental health issues.

Students who matriculate from Rowley Alternative School to mainstream middle schools have a safety net to assist in preventing recidivism and in acclimating back to mainstream school. Ongoing behavioral and mental health counseling is offered to them to help with the transition.

Committed to educating the next generation of nurses, the MHSF Health Centers adopted a virtual education model of clinical learning. By connecting through an on-line interactive video platform, student nurses were able to participate "virtually" in actual Health Center patient visits.

physical health

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic and COVID-related lock downs, the MHSF Health Center team continued to manage the ongoing healthcare needs of the population it serves. These services included annual well care, COVID-19 testing and vaccines and other general health needs.

Our partner schools, St. Bernard Parish Public Schools and Nunez Community College, were integral components of our overall continued success during these trying times.

Mothers' Milk Bank of Louisiana

AT OCHSNER BAPTIST

WHAT

- Only human donor milk bank in Louisiana located at Ochsner Baptist in New Orleans
- Ochsner Milk Bank has relationships with 18 Louisiana Neonatal Intensive Care Units (NICU)

WHY

 Mother's milk is crucial to premature babies and decreases odds of life-threating complications. If mothers of preterm infants cannot provide milk, pasteurized donated human milk is the next best option

RESULTS

- 110 women donated over 757 gallons of breast milk in 2020
- 425 gallons consumed by newborns in the NICU in 2020
- Recent approval of Louisiana Medicaid reimbursement for human donor milk provided to NICU will provide Milk Bank sustainable revenue

Additional Program Goals to increase donor diversity

- Create a lactation space to offer peer group sessions for lactating women to increase demographic equity among donors
- Collaborative partnership with a national foundation-funded initiative to improve breastfeeding rates at discharge among NICU infants/families of diverse ethnicities

MHSF has provided multi-year support for the Milk Bank coordinator position and other program expenses.

COMMUNITIES IN SCHOOLS (CIS) GULF SOUTH

WHAT

- CIS serves as the social worker/licensed mental health professional in schools
- 36 mental health professionals in 27 schools in Orleans Parish
- Tier One Services to 10,500 students to help build awareness, skills and access to services
- One-on-one case management services to over 1,800 students

WHY

- Despite challenges during COVID-19 with 16,000 Louisiana students not attending school, CIS has established:
 - Online counseling to virtual learner students needing services
 - Google classrooms to offer socialemotional groups and lessons to virtual learner students
 - Online "office hours" for student telehealth visits to a mental health professional

RESULTS

- Allows school administration to focus on education and CIS to focus on student social/ emotional issues
 - Critical during COVID-19

MHSF has provided multi-year operating support of CIS's operations in the Greater New Orleans area.

New Orleans East Real-Time Crime Camera Program

New Orleans Police & Justice Foundation / New Orleans Police District 7

WHAT

- Program to install two types of crime cameras in New Orleans East
- High visibility pole-mounted white box cameras in high-traffic
- SafeCam crime cameras on residences and businesses strategically located near pole-mounted cameras

WHY

- Create an integrated link of cameras to the Real-Time Crime Camera Center to reduce crime, identify and address quality of life issues (dumping, flooding), traffic incidents
- Assist NOPD to efficiently patrol incidents in 130 square miles of New Orleans East

RESULTS

- Installed eleven pole-mounted white box cameras and ten SafeCam cameras on residences and businesses
- Cameras used 90 times to assist with 38 person crimes, eight quality-of-life issues and 38 traffic/vehicle incidents

MHSF is providing support to install up to 60 pole-mounted and SafeCam cameras in New Orleans East over three years. This partnership will enhance community safety, a social determinant of health.

LOUISIANA CENTER FOR CHILDREN'S RIGHTS

WHAT

- A non-profit law office that defends, on average, 500 young people in Louisiana's justice system annually
 • Multidisciplinary Children's Defense Team comprised of
- Attorneys, Social Workers and Youth Advocates
- Wraparound services to assist families with housing, food insecurity, access to healthcare and other social services

WHY

- Help and support youth in the criminal justice system to:
 - Reduce recidivism
 - Improve public safety
 - Improve long-term life and adult health outcomes
 - Assist youth to become productive members of society through education, job training and employment





FRIENDS OF FISHER HOUSE

OF SOUTHERN LOUISIANA

WHAT

• A new 14,000 square foot house on Veterans Administration (VA) Hospital grounds to serve veterans and their families with free lodging while at the VA Hospital

WHY

 Approximately 140,000 veterans reside in Southeast Louisiana greater than 50 miles from the Hospital; 40% with annual income < \$50,000

RESULTS

• Now Open - Fisher House began accepting guests in December 2020

MHSF contributed to the capital campaign to build the 85th Friends of Fisher House in the U.S. Once the building was completed, it was donated to the Veterans Administration which is responsible for staffing and management.


COVID-19 vaccine extravaganza

scholarships

HEALTHCARE PROFESSION SCHOLARSHIPS – INVESTMENT FOR THE HEALTH OF OUR COMMUNITY Since its early days as a foundation, MHSF has supported a wide range of healthcare scholarships. Our Board recognizes the significant return on investment that scholarship programs provide students to complete a professional certification and, hopefully, remain in the Greater New Orleans region.

Our initial scholarship program began in 2006 with nursing students at the University of Holy Cross (UHC). Our first UHC nursing scholarship was endowed in 2008 and an additional nursing scholarship was endowed for first generation students in honor and memory of Richard A. Henault, MHSF Executive Vice President, a champion of our scholarship program.

We are fortunate that our community boasts excellent educational institutions that offer healthcare programs. The Foundation has supported licensed practical nurse programs at Nunez Community College and Delgado Community College. We have supported nursing students at Southeastern and in 2020 added a nursing scholarship program at Dillard University.

Focus expanded five years ago with a scholarship program at Xavier University of Louisiana's highly rated College of Pharmacy. This relationship has been so successful that we recently endowed a Pharmacy scholarship with funds matched by Xavier Pharmacy alumni.













Experience with our grant partners and school based health centers and a rise in the incidence of mental health issues in our community has highlighted the dearth of mental health specialists. As a result, we started a scholarship program with the UHC Counseling Program in 2020. We will expand our counseling scholarship program in Summer 2021 to the University of New Orleans, the State's first accredited counseling program.

Scholarships are focused on students living in our target service area of New Orleans East, Gentilly and St. Bernard. Our funding has supported 50+ nursing students, 20 pharmacy students and 19 counseling students.

We continue to be inspired by the dedication and hard work of our scholarship recipients. Many are non-traditional students that have elected to return to school while raising children and working. Their stories of hardship and triumph are motivating and inspiring. They have chosen a profession in healthcare with an intent to serve. We are honored to help them achieve that goal.

Louisianians continue to rank near the bottom nationally with chronic diseases and health issues. The onset of the COVID-19 pandemic has only exacerbated these issues. MHSF supported many varied programs over the years striving to improve the health and wellbeing of our community. We believe a long term investment in education for healthcare professions will not only improve the lives of the recipients but return dividends to our community.


